## Preface

You are reading this book because you have an interest in pursuing a career as a most important educator. As the research over recent years has shown, the school principal is one of the most important ingredients of a successful school—a school where children learn. The purpose of this book is to help you make an important decision about whether or not you really want to take the step toward becoming such a critical part of effective education by serving as a principal.
